

Improving Migrant Workers' Wellbeing

Charity of Choice – Donor Initiated Project

The SBF Foundation also supports donors and businesses interested in causes close to their hearts be it in the social, educational, arts, sports, environment, or others. Project MigrantWell is one such donor initiative, a philanthropic effort by the Founding Donors - **Estate of Khoo Teck Puat** and **Estate of Ng Teng Fong** to uplift the health and wellbeing of migrant workers in Singapore. This involves the establishment of a charity, MigrantWell Singapore, a MigrantWell Welfare Fund and St. Andrew's Migrant Worker Medical Centre at Penjuru Recreation Centre.

MigrantWell Welfare Fund


The Fund addresses other healthcare needs of migrant workers not provided under the Primary Care Plan (PCP). The Fund supports programmes by other like-minded social organisations for the health and well-being of migrant workers in Singapore, with the intention to multiply the impact to more migrant workers, working in unison with other organisations. The Foundation invites the business community to contribute via donations that will collectively support our migrant workforce, just as the business community supports workers like employees in need and lower-wage workers. All qualifying donations will be eligible for a 250% tax deduction.



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Care Gaps Complementing Primary Care Plan

Aim to serve at least 1300 patients in the first year and DOUBLE in the second year



- Dental services prioritise treatment for dental-related infections which cause long-term discomfort over dental maintenance
- Services provided are diagnostic (examination of the teeth using Xrays), routine (covers overall health of the teeth and oral hygiene including extractions, tooth decay treatments and periodontal therapy) and complex (provides common dental surgeries such as surgical excision of wisdom teeth and endodontic treatment)
- Up to quarter three, 671 patients were served, and 3 months waitlist with 400 patients

- Physiotherapy services focus on the prevention of exacerbation of injuries and maintaining their physical health
 - Services provided are diagnostic (examination of the patient on orthopaedic, musculoskeletal and neuropathic issues) and treatment. The treatment includes rehabilitative and maintenance therapy, focusing on pain management and common musculoskeletal disorders such as lumbar, knee and cervical issues.
- Up to quarter two, 106 patients were served

- Psychological services prevent the escalation of distress possibly caused by threats of deportation and separation from families.
- Casework management that supports the workers in resolving their family, financial and complex issues. This support complements mental health counselling under PCP, to encourage workers to step forward to seek holistic help for their overall wellbeing.
- Up to quarter two, 25 patients were served
